SECTION B (ARRANGEMENT)

Decorative Flower Compositions

Composition and arrangement are synonymous in meaning. Accessories may or may not be used in all compositions. Exhibitors are requested to name plant material used in compositions on small card to be placed on table. No backgrounds will be used. Special table covering optional; to be supplied by the exhibitor.

Suitable foliage may be used in any class at the discretion of exhibitor but required flowers must predominate. Containers to be supplied by exhibitor.

SPECIAL CLASS

Class 10—A Composition to show the best decorative value of the Dahlia. Color, type and size of Dahlia blooms optional.

Special Award in Class 10 of \$25 in cash by the Management of the Essex House.

Class 11—A composition of "My Favorite Dahlias." Class 12—Red and white Dahlias with gray green

Tips for the Novice Showman

Study your schedule and classification list carefully—a splendid entry in the wrong class results in disqualification!

Cut blooms in the evening—store overnight in deep cold water in a cool cellar—if available.

Do not pack too tightly for transporting. Better use an extra box or two. Place lightly crushed soft paper underneath and between the blossoms.

If possible arrive at Showroom an hour or two early—better opportunity to procure containers, water, etc.

After setting up display, re-check schedule and be sure your entry is in the proper class. If in doubt ask any experienced showman or any officer of the Society.

After the awards have been made, check any non-winning entry and try to ascertain the reason you were defeated. Ask a competent judge to help you. You may receive very valuable information for the future.

Also, he was an outstanding grower of exhibition dahlias. Those who attended the 1950 Southern States Show, will remember his entries of Mrs. Hester Pape. He exhibited entries of 25 blooms, 12 blooms, 5 blooms, 3 blooms and 1 bloom—all from one small back yard.

Besides his dahlia work, Mr. Goodwin was very active in church, civic and other organizations.

"REV" will always be missed and remembered for his honesty, faithfulness, sincerity, leadership and dahlia growing.

We only wish we had more like him.

He is survived by his wife, and one son, Dr. Charles R. Goodwin.

His wife, affectionately known as "Mrs. REV", plans to carry on the work that the two did so well together.

Now that the dahlia growing season is under way we want to help you keep them coming for your pleasure and the fall shows. Insect injury causes stunted growth, and virus diseases are transmitted almost entirely by some of these insects. Many of our customers have had such wonderful results with the NEW INSECT CONTROL the past two growing seasons, that we are again calling it to your attention.

INSECT CONTROL

Since the use of DDT much more red spider and mite have been prevalent on dahlias. We have used DDT, nicotine sulphate, rotenone, and pyrethrum in a spray with fair results. Have used DDT with Hexate with fairly good results but we could not recommend either of these sprays to our customers as they gave only a partial control.
